

New Release from Plain View Prem Wild Beasts

Book description: A collection of poems by a Hispano-Caribbean author, exploring contemporary socio-political issues, including cultural hybridity and bilingualism, racial and ethnic allegiances and designations, oppression, feminist issues, and more. With careful attention to the music of the line, these poems are rich in imagery and metaphor, exhibiting a multivocality, a polyrhythmic aesthetic with echoes of the luscious amalgam that is the Caribbean region. The book is comprised of 88 pages and is divided into three sections subtitled: "Fangs," "Claws" and "Horns." The cover art is a painting titled "Chromatic Jungle" by the internationally renowned Dominican artist, Amaya Salazar.

About the author: The Dominican-American, Alba Cruz-Hacker, straddles borders. A Pushcart Prize nominee, she was the recipient of the 2007 UCR Poet Laureate Award and the 2007 Thomas Rivera Selection for Poetry. She has lived throughout North and Central America and the Caribbean, but has been residing in California for the past 18 years. Her creative and academic work has been published throughout the Caribbean, Canada and the United States, both in print and on the web, including *Poetry Magazine* (Senior Editor's Choice), *The Caribbean Writer, Canadian Woman Studies, Spillway Review, Pacific Review, Bear Flag Republic: Prose Poems and Poetics from California* (anthology edited by Gary Young), and the Hispanic volume of the *American Encyclopedia of Ethnic Literature*, among others. She teaches creative writing at the University of California Riverside.
