There will be a lot of changes for the upcoming Fall 2010 registration season. The first major change is that the CRWT and the THEA courses will be jointly as **CWPA** Creative Writing and Writing for the Performing Arts.

All of the subject matter will remain the same, but the listing will be different. For example CRWT 262 will be listed as CWPA 262 and THEA 266 will be listed as CWPA 266. These are the same courses and you will receive the same amount of credit as you would before. The only change is the name.

This will not affect any of the courses that you have already taken. All courses taken that counted toward graduation

requirements still count.



## A MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRS OF CREATIVE WRITING AND THEATRE

Welcome to the first edition of the MFA newsletter. We will be publishing this on the third Friday of each month. If you have any news you would like included in the next issue, please let Adrienne know a week in advance.

All academic departments and programs are reviewed every five or seven years by outsiders—this standard practice is often pro forma, nobody learns much of anything, and the report molders away in a drawer until the next one, five or seven years later. Our MFA program review this year was bound to have some news, though, because it was the first review the program has ever had and because the program has grown so fast. Even since I arrived four short years ago, the number of graduate students has more than tripled and the faculty has grown almost as fast. There were bound to be growing pains.

We have a lot to be proud of in those four short years. Faculty have won three Guggenheims and have been awarded a raft of other prizes, our graduate students and faculty are publishing up a storm, and the national profiles of both our main campus MFA and the Palm Desert Low Residency program have soared. The report lauded us for these accomplishments.

The report also pointed to some weaknesses, and the faculty has been meeting to address them and plan for the future. We have been rewriting the MFA Handbook and some of the program requirements, and these will be available soon. The Handbook will be what is called (somewhat hyperbolically) a ‘living document,’ which means it will be revised each year as we move forward, with input from students and faculty. We have rededicated ourselves to our goals of being among the finest MFA programs in the world, giving our students the best possible educational experience, and creating a culture in which we all kick ass together.

We encourage you to meet everyone on the faculty in both departments and to talk with your colleagues. Try to attend as many readings, performances, lectures, and panels that you can and utilize all the resources available to you at UCR. The network that you develop here is an important asset that can support you throughout your career.

While classes and activities can keep you busy, you should have some fun. So Juan Felipe Herrera is working with Adrienne Thomas and students to plan an MFA Prom this spring (details to follow), and we hope to see you all there.


