Amy Wallace is an award-winning journalist. Among the national publications in which her work has appeared are *The New Yorker*, Vanity Fair, Esquire, Men's Journal, Elle, the New York Times Magazine, The Nation and Conde Nast Portfolio, the business magazine where she is a contributing editor. Previously, she spent fourteen years at the Los Angeles Times, first as a reporter and later as a Deputy Business Editor over entertainment and technology coverage. She also spent four years as a senior writer at Los Angeles Magazine, where her 2001 profile of the editor-in-chief of *Daily Variety*, the entertainment industry's trade paper, was a finalist for both the National Magazine Award and the Gerald F. Loeb Award and took top honors at the City Magazine Association Awards. She has covered politics, higher education and Hollywood, and was a co-recipient at The Times of two staff-wide Pulitzer Prizes (in 1992, for coverage of the Los Angeles riots, and in 1994, for coverage of the Northridge earthquake). THE HAYS PRESS-ENTERPRISE LECTURE KEYNOTE SPEAKER

WALTER ISAACSON is the President and CEO of the Aspen Institute. He has been the Chairman and CEO of CNN and the editor of *Time* Magazine. He is the author of *Einstein: His Life and Universe* (2007), *Benjamin Franklin: An American Life* (2003),



and Kissinger: A Biography (1992) and is the coauthor of The Wise Men: Six Friends and the World They Made (1986). Isaacson was born on May 20, 1952, in New Orleans. He is a graduate of Harvard College and of Pembroke College of Oxford University, where he was a Rhodes Scholar. He began his career at the Sunday Times of London and then the New Orleans Times-Picayune/States-*Item*. He joined Time Magazine in 1978 and served as

a political correspondent, national editor and editor of new media before becoming the magazine's fourteenth managing editor in 1996. He became Chairman and CEO of CNN in 2001, and then president and CEO of the Aspen Institute in 2003. After Hurricane Katrina in 2005, he was appointed by Governor Kathleen Blanco to be the vice-chairman of the Louisiana Recovery Authority. In December 2007, he was appointed by President George W. Bush to be the chairman of the U.S.-Palestinian Partnership, a government and private sector effort to provide economic and educational opportunities for the Palestinian people. He is the Chairman of the Board of Teach for America, and he is on the boards of United Airlines, Tulane University, and Science Service. He is also on the advisory councils of the National Institutes of Health, the National Constitution Center, and the Shakespeare Theatre in Washington, D.C. He lives with his wife and daughter in Washington, D.C.



Gustavo Arellano is a staff writer with OC Weekly, an alternative newspaper in Orange County, California, a contributing editor to the Los Angeles Times Op/Ed pages, and frequent guest on Public Radio International's Weekend America. He writes "¡Ask a Mexican!," a nationally syndicated column in which he answers any and all questions about America's spiciest and largest minority. The column has a weekly circulation of over two million in thirty-seven newspapers across the United States, won the 2006 and 2008 Association of Alternative Weeklies award for Best Column, and was published in book form by Scribner Press in May 2007. Arellano has been the subject of press coverage in the Los Angeles Times, Houston Chronicle, Reuters, Mexico City's El Universal newspaper, The Today Show, Hannity & Colmes, Nightline, The New York Times, Good Morning America, Utne and The Colbert Report. Gustavo was a finalist for the 2005 Maggie Award's Best Public Service Series or Article category for his work on the Catholic Diocese of Orange sex-abuse scandal, a topic for which he was the recipient of the Lilly Scholarship in Religion from the Religion Newswriters Association. Gustavo is also the recipient of the Los Angeles Press Club's 2007 President's Award and an Impacto Award from the National Hispanic Media Coalition, and was recognized by the California Latino Legislative Caucus with a 2008 Spirit Award for his "exceptional vision, creativity, and work ethic." Gustavo lives in Orange County and is the proud son of two Mexican immigrants, one who was illegal.





Mark Jenkins is a field staff writer for *National Geographic Magazine* and the Writer-in-Residence at the University of Wyoming. A critically acclaimed author and internationally recognized journalist, Jenkins covers the globe writing about geopolitical issues, from opium smuggling in Afghanistan to HIV/AIDS in Botswana, ethnic cleansing in Burma to mountaineering in Pakistan. Jenkins' stories have been selected for inclusion in three consecutive Best American Travel Writing anthologies. In 2008 Jenkins' won a Maggie for his story about panic in Backpacker magazine. In 2006 Jenkins won the Lowell Thomas Award for both Best Adventure Travel Article and Best Environmental Tourism Article, In 2003, Jenkins won the American Alpine Club Literary Award for excellence in alpine literature. In the spring of 2002 Jenkins was awarded the McGaw/Hull Endowed Chair in Literature at the University of Wyoming. Jenkins has twice won the W.A.C. Literature Fellowship (1986, 1989), twice won the Polartec Explorers Award (1990, 1998), and won a Shipton/Tilman Award (2004). Jenkins' most recent book, A Man's Life, his second volume of collected works, (published by Modern Times in 2007) won the Banff Mountain Book Festival 2008 Adventure Travel Award. Kirkus says: "Jenkins' superb memory and solid writing chops break him out from the pack of true-life adventure scribes." The Rocky Mountain News calls Jenkins' essays "rich with self-examination and descriptions of world-class adventures many people can't even imagine." Jenkins is the author of three previous award-winning books: The Hard Way, To Timbuktu and Off the Map.





Christopher Buckley is a Guggenheim Fellow in poetry for 2007-2008. His most recent book is *And the Sea* from The Sheep Meadow press in New York. In 2008 his fifteenth and sixteenth books were published: *Modern History: Prose Poems 1987-2007* from Tupelo Press and *Rolling the Bones* from Eastern Washington University Press. Alcatraz Editions published *Bear Flag Republic: Prose Poems and Poetics from California* which he edited with Gary Young. He teaches in the Creative Writing department at the University of California Riverside.





Joseph Stroud was born in 1943 in Glendale, California. He received his B.A. in Literature and Philosophy in 1966 and his M.A. in Creative Writing from San Francisco State University in 1968. He is the author of *In the Sleep of Rivers* (Capra Press, 1974), *Signatures* (BOA Editions, Ltd., 1982), *Below Cold Mountain* (Copper Canyon Press, 1998), *Country of Light* (Copper Canyon Press, 2004), *Of This World: New and Selected Poems* (Copper Canyon Press, 2008), and four limited-edition chapbooks. He taught writing and literature at Cabrillo Community College for thirty-five years and co-hosted *The Poetry Show* on KUSP radio. His work has earned a Pushcart Prize and he is the recipient of the prestigious Witter Bynner Fellowship from the Library of Congress. His poems have been featured on National Public Radio, the *Los Angeles Times*, and *The Washington Post*. He divides his time between Santa Cruz and a cabin at Shay Creek in the Sierra Nevada.







Marsha de la O's first book of poetry, *Black Hope*, won the New Issues Press Poetry Prize and a Small Press Editor's Choice Award. It has recently gone into a second edition. She is the winner of the dA Poetry Award and the Ventura Poetry Festival Contest. She has published in journals such as *Barrow Street*, *Passages North*, *Solo*, and *Third Coast*. She was raised in the Los Angeles area and now lives in Ventura, California where she is co-editor for the literary journal, *Askew*. She is currently working on a novel.

Susan Straight, Professor of Creative Writing at the University of California, Riverside, has won the Gold Medal for Fiction from the San Francisco-based Commonwealth Club for her fifth novel, *Highwire Moon*. A National Book Award finalist, *Highwire Moon* details the lives of Serafina, an undocumented a Mexican-Indian immigrant torn way from her American-born daughter, Elvia, during an immigration raid. *Highwire Moon* traces their struggle to reunite despite grinding poverty, backbreaking toil, the seamy Southern California subculture of methamphetamine addicts and the foster care system. Straight's other critically acclaimed fiction includes *Aquaboogie*, *I Been in Sorrow's Kitchen and Licked Out All the Pots*, *The Gettin' Place*, and *Blacker Than a Thousand Midnights*. She has also written two children's books, *Bear E. Bear* and *The Hallway Light at Night*. Straight sets all her novels in the fictional town of Rio Seco, California, a loose parallel to her hometown, Riverside. Among her awards are the prestigious Lannan Foundation Award in 1999 and a 1997 Guggenheim Fellowship.







ABOUT THE RIVERSIDE PUBLIC LIBRARY

The mission of the Riverside Public Library is to circulate books and other library resources, promote personal competency in seeking and evaluating information, and present quality programs in a welcoming environment to the residents of the City of Riverside so that they may become productive participants in the literate society.

The Riverside Public Library has a history that reaches back to 1888, growing from just a few rooms in the historic Loring Building to a distinguished Mission-Revival Library building financed by Andrew Carnegie to its current system of a Main Library and five branch libraries. Today, the Riverside Public Library serves a fast growing community of approximately 300,000 covering eighty-five square miles. With a collection of approximately 600,000 books and other library materials, as well as 125 public access computers and an annual circulation of 1.2 million, the Riverside Public Library is a major provider of information services and cultural programs in California's Inland Empire.




MAPS & DIRECTIONS

HOW TO FIND UCR

From Orange County: From the 91 freeway: Take the 91 freeway east to the 60 freeway east. Exit at University Avenue and turn left. Go to the second light and make a right onto Campus Drive. From Palm Springs: Take the 10 freeway west to the junction with the 60 freeway and go west. Exit at University Avenue and turn left. Go to the first traffic signal and turn right onto Campus Drive. From San Bernardino: Take the 215 freeway south to the junction with the 60 freeway and go east. Exit at University Avenue and turn left. Go to the second traffic signal and turn right onto Campus Drive. From San Diego County: Take the 15 freeway north to the 215 north and then the 60 freeway west. Exit at University Avenue and turn left. Go to the first light and make a right on Campus Drive. From Los Angeles County: From the 10 freeway: Take the 10 freeway east to Interstate 15 south and then to the 60 freeway east. Exit at University Avenue and turn left. Go to the second light and make a right onto Campus Drive. From the 60 freeway: Take the 60 freeway east. Exit at University Avenue and turn left. Go to the second light and make a right onto Campus Drive
