Application Instructions & Information

GUIDELINES FOR DISSERTATION YEAR PROGRAMS (DYP)

DYP awards are intended to provide support to graduate students who are nearing completion of their dissertation research and expect to complete their dissertation within the academic year in which the award is granted.

Eligibility Criteria

- 1. Must be a Ph.D. student who has advanced to candidacy by January 31, 2021.
- 2. Must not have more than 7 units of incomplete grades.
- 3. Must be able to complete the dissertation by June 2022.
- 4. Must be making acceptable progress toward the degree. (For these purposes, acceptable progress for a Ph.D. student means advanced to candidacy within 15 quarters after entry and must complete the degree by the normative time to degree for the particular program plus 1 year at time of degree.)
- 5. Can be on leave to apply, but must be enrolled as a full-time student (12 units) during tenure of fellowship.
- 6. Domestic and international students are eligible to apply.

Application Procedure

The applicant must follow the graduate program's instructions for deadlines to complete the application form, including the research statement. Two letters of recommendation from faculty are required for each nominated application; one letter must be from the dissertation adviser. Programs will submit final applications from nominees no later than January 31, 2021.

Support Summary

\$7,200 stipend per quarter (Summer '21, Fall '21, Winter '22, Spring '22) up to three quarters, plus fees (fees applicable FWS only). Employment supplementation is not allowable during the quarters of the award.

Some awards are funded through UCOP monies available only to domestic students who meet diversity criteria. Thus, all domestic students need to complete the diversity form so Graduate Division can determine an appropriate funding source for each awardee. A diversity statement is require to be considered for the award.



Research Statement Instructions & Information

Length and formatting: maximum two pages, 12-point font, single-spaced, one-inch margins. Images, charts, graphs, or tables are included in the 2-page limit. You may use up to one additional page for references. Submit a separate PDF of your research statement or attach to this form.

Prompt: please write a research statement in response to the questions below. Be sure to respond to both parts (1.) and (2.) of the prompt.

- 1. What problem does your research address or attempt to resolve? What original contribution to the field of study does your research make? Your response should indicate how your research is original and creative within its context or field and why other researchers in your field would be interested in it.
- 2. What are the primary contributions your work stands to make outside of your field of study, and what potential does your research have to foster cross-fertilization of ideas in similar fields? Your response should indicate how your research advances discovery and understanding and explain the approach you will take to conducting your research. Which members of society—apart from researchers in your field—might benefit from your work?

Notes: Faculty from related disciplines, but not those in your graduate program, will review your application, so your essay should be tailored to an educated but non-specialist audience. Avoid field-specific jargon.

You are encouraged to seek writing assistance from the Graduate Writing Center (http://gwrc.ucr.edu), but please note that not all consultants in the GWC offer consultations for this application. Graduate advisors and others in your program may also provide advice.
