Collection of Science Fiction and Fantasy, the largest publicly accessible speculative fiction (SF) archive in the world, and has been a cornerstone of research in and around SF. Over the course of its nearly 50-year history, the conference has supported both emerging and established scholars from around the globe. After a decade-long hiatus, we are pleased to share our efforts to revive this event as a place for new and emerging SF scholars and creatives to present their work, foster connections, and conceptualize potential projects involving the Eaton Collection.

Participants are invited to present any scholarly or creative work that addresses speculative fiction in relation to the archive. We especially encourage submissions which engage with the J. Lloyd Eaton Collection, but papers exploring other intersections between SF and the archive are also welcome. Presenters will be organized into graduate and undergraduate panels for 10-15 minute presentations, followed by Q&A. This symposium is meant to support emerging scholars and ideas, so we encourage those not experienced with conferences to apply.
