The Centre for Medieval Studies at the University of Toronto hosts one of the most renowned interdisciplinary medieval studies programs in the world. Students can enroll in a Master of Arts (MA) program, a Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) program, and one of several Collaborative Programs.



DOCTOR OF PHILOSOPHY

The <u>PhD in Medieval Studies</u> is a five-year dissertation-oriented program designed to enable students to achieve a high degree of specialization and a broad understanding of Medieval Studies. Consisting of coursework, linguistic training, and research, the PhD program provides students with faculty mentorship and support, and opportunities for pedagogy and collaboration.

MASTER OF ARTS

The MA in Medieval Studies is a one-year program conceived for students who want to explore the field in all its breadth while also strengthening their expertise in Latin. It is especially well-suited for students who are considering further study in Medieval Studies doctoral programs or cognate programs, but also for those who want to pursue professional opportunities and careers beyond the university which require a strong background in the humanities and unique linguistic skills.



FUNDING

All accepted PhD students receive a <u>base funding package</u> for up to five years that includes tuition fees and health insurance (UHIP) for international students, and consists of varying combinations and amounts of external scholarships and academic work.

Financial resources, on top of the base funding package, are available in the form of Teaching Assistantships, Research Assistantships, Course Instructorships, and <u>Awards</u>.

MA applicants in particular should contact the Centre's Graduate Administration as soon as possible to receive information about bursaries and scholarly grants.

CMS also offers <u>additional funding</u> for travel and research through internal awards.

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COLLABORATIVE PROGRAMS

CMS students benefit from the Centre's involvement in the graduate programs of more than fifteen cognate departments and participation in six collaborative programs. These specializations provide an additional multidisciplinary experience, connecting students with an interest in a particular field, allowing them to engage with professors and colleagues across disciplines.
