CENTERING EQUITY IN TEACHER EDUCATION: Challenges and Opportunities

UC doctoral students of education (and related disciplines) often apply for and assume faculty or policy positions featuring teacher education (TE). Exemplary TE work is crucial for fostering equitable and inclusive K-12 education, and UC graduates have important roles to play in this work. How can one envision and prepare for roles and responsibilities of such positions?

This seminar will be hosted by UC Davis and taught remotely for graduate students across UC campuses. The seminar will explore current TE challenges in California and beyond and solutions to those challenges. Guest speakers, panel members, and workshop facilitators will include: (a) UC doctoral program alumni involved in TE at CSU and other campuses; (b) UC senate and clinical TE-focused faculty and postdocs; and (c) TE policy makers and leaders.

Participants will develop a portfolio of resources as reflective learning opportunities and pragmatic materials for use in potential future professional work.

Seminar topics may include:

- Multiple embedded policy and practice spheres impacting TE (state, system, campus, program, course)
- Current challenges in TE practice and innovative responses/solutions (e.g., teacher residencies)
- TE candidates: shortages, recruitment of BIPoC candidates, retention
- Teacher performance assessments and programmatic evaluations: status and resistance
- What does equity look like in TE at systemic and local levels: promise and possibilities addressing diversity/equity/inclusion (DEI) in TE, focused on:
 - multilingual learners
 - o racially diverse K-12 students and TE credential candidates
 - LGBTQ+/queer inclusion
 - neurodiverse children and youth
- Preparing teachers to attend to emotional and mental health of K-12 learners and preservice teachers (PSTs)
- Locating and cataloging resources and links to support TE: e.g., policy white papers, higher ed websites, resources of CTERIN (California Teacher Education Research and Improvement Network)

Portfolio submissions (3-4-page pieces grounded in research, theory, professional practice, policy, and lived experience) **may include:**

- Vision statement for TE: what do available resources tell me is needed and what might be my special place within such work?
- An emerging challenge in TE and a proposal for how to respond programmatically
- Statement on plans to address one or more DEI themes in TE
- Preparing for resistance to inclusive TE (from colleagues, TE students, K-12 based educators, parents/families/communities)
- Mini-proposal for a collaboratively designed TE research study (a cross-campus design, to move beyond one's silo)
- Design of a pedagogical innovation for a TE course (syllabus, unit, lesson, lesson series)
- Mentoring/supervision as learning opportunities, beyond management models
