HDR RECAP

ADMINISTRATIVE CORE

To gather feedback from the center community, the HDR Administrative Core emailed a survey to its constituents in January 2024. We received 56 responses, including 39 from inside UCR and 17 from outside of UCR. We asked participants to indicate, for the core services they utilized, their degree of satisfaction (on a scale ranging from 1=very dissatisfied to 4 = very satisfied). Respondents indicated that, on average, they were very satisfied with each of the four cores: Administrative Core, Research Infrastructure Core, Investigator Development Core, and Community Engagement Core. We asked respondents to evaluate the frequency (1 = Never, 2 = Rarely, 3 = Sometimes, 4 = Often, 5 = Always) and quality (1 = Poor, 2 = Fair, 3 = Good, 4 = Very good, 5 = Excellent) of the center's community engagement. Respondents, on average, rated the frequency of engagement as often and the quality of engagement as very good. Respondents' recommendations for improvement centered on greater communication about the center's services, greater utilization of advisory board members, better integration with other medical school initiatives, improved administrative processes to preserve relations with community partners, and expanded compensation and professional development for community health workers.

Research Spotlight

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT DISSEMINATION CORE

HDR would like to highlight the work of Dr. Kalina Michalska and their recent publication in BMC Psychiatry, Pre-scan anxiety is associated with greater right amygdala-hippocampal response to fearful versus happy faces among trait-anxious Latina girls. Dr. Michalska worked with Dr. Dana Diaz, a postdoctoral research fellow in the Department of Psychiatry at Columbia University and Department of Psychology at UCR, and Dr. Wan-Ling Tseng from the Yale Child Study Center at Yale School of Medicine to examine anxiety levels and emotional processing of facial expressions among Latina youth. This study was part of a HDR round three funded pilot project with Dr. Michalska and Jordan Mullins, a UCR Doctoral Student in Psychology. Congrats Dr. Michalska!

RIVERSIDE UNIVERSITY HEALTH SYSTEM, RIVERSIDE OVERDOSE DATA TO ACTION (RODA)

In response to the sharp increase in the number and rates of overdose deaths, the Riverside Overdose Data to Action (RODA) program was established in September 2019 to enhance surveillance of overdose morbidity and mortality and to use enhanced surveillance data to guide overdose prevention efforts. RODA has since then launched the RODA Data Dashboard and began working on a 5 year grant from the CDC, the Overdose Data to Action Program which aims to reduce morbidity and mortality as well as reduce disparities.
