How to Write a High-Quality Department Research Grant

The Most Important Questions to Answer:

- 1. Clearly state your research question.
- 2. Clearly describe how you seek to answer it and why you will answer it in the way that you have chosen.
- 3. Explain why you chose your method.
 - o How/why does that method best let you answer your question?
- 4. Explain how and why you chose the case(s) you are studying.
 - o What does that selection help us learn?
- 5. Articulate a clear theoretical framework.
 - Explain your project's contribution to the political science literature.

Other Questions to Address

- 1. Why is your topic important? (Briefly!)
 - Which members of society—apart from researchers in your field—might benefit from your work?
 - To address this, you might explain how your research informs policy or contributes to the policy community.
- 2. How does your study add to understanding on the topic beyond what has previously been done?
 - o What is your original contribution to the field?
 - What contributions could your research make to related fields outside your main field of study?
- 3. How will this project help you advance through the program?

Criteria Used by the Graduate Committee to Evaluate Fellowship Applications

- 1. Student Preparedness:
 - How prepared is the student to complete their dissertation in the appropriate timeframe?
 - Do they know their field and have the requisite methodological skills and background knowledge required?

2. Clear Research Plan:

 Does the student present a clear plan about how they will conduct research and complete the remaining chapters of their dissertation?

3. Well-Articulated Proposal:

- o How well-articulated is their proposal?
- 4. Significance of Contribution:
 - How significant is the student's contribution to the literature?
 - o What is the importance of their research question?
