UAW UPDATE



As many of you know, our union ratified a contract extension late last year. This extension shifts the contract's expiration from May to December 31, with new contract negotiations set to begin in July. The extension also includes a 4% raise starting in October, and all campuses will pilot a transitional funding program as part of the agreement.
