### **Anticipated Needs**

**Note:** All part-time faculty appointments are temporary and do not confer academic rank. Final determination of part-time teaching assignments is contingent upon student enrollment figures and funding. In addition to teaching, the position requires weekly office hours and participation in assessment of student learning, and university. The successful candidate will be held to the standards and requirements of the college and department in which he/she/they is/are employed. Given CSUN's commitment to excellence in teaching, research, and engagement in a diverse environment, the successful candidate will help the Department achieve equitable academic outcomes for all students through teaching, student mentorship, and scholarship.

### **Qualifications**

1. With the exception of POLS 347, 450, 455, 457A, 457B, 471F, 496IL, and 496SX, applicants must hold a Ph.D. in Political Science or a closely related discipline, or be in the advanced stages of Ph.D. candidacy. Applicants in candidacy must have passed the comprehensive examination for a Ph.D. in Political Science or a closely related discipline and have an academic specialization in American Government, Comparative Politics, International Relations, Public Policy, Political Theory, or Research Methodology. Applicants must also demonstrate subject-matter expertise in the courses they are applying to teach, as well as university-level teaching experience in the relevant field(s).
2. For POLS 347, 450, 455, 457A, 457B, 471F, 496 IL, and 496SX, a J.D. from an ABA-accredited institution may be substituted for the Ph.D. or advanced Ph.D. candidacy requirement. Applicants must demonstrate subject-matter expertise in the specific courses they are applying to teach. Applicants must also have university-level teaching

experience in the field of law or a minimum of five years of professional experience as a licensed attorney.

3. Applicants must demonstrate a strong record of or the potential for teaching, mentoring, and working effectively with a diverse student population.


