This multidisciplinary conference explores the conjunction of a range of forces that are shaping the contemporary production of life and of the lifeworld. The development of new medical technologies, the emergence of new forms of digital communication, and the dawning of climate emergency have produced novel forms of artificial life and generated radical new means of imagining what life itself might be. The program will bring together creative practitioners, critics, and theorists to ask what futures these artificial lives might portend, and how we might draw from our various archives—literary, visual, medical, historical—so that we might prepare for them.
