## “Refusing ‘Queer Paradise’: Māhū Pedagogies of Queer Indigenous Re-Memory in Hawai‘i”

Based on close readings of a queer Native Hawaiian ‘zine and LGBTQ+ travel writing about Hawai‘i, this talk develops the concept of “māhū pedagogies” to argue that while settler homonationalist tourism narratives enact cultural prostitution by figuring Hawai‘i as a “queer paradise” absent of Native resurgence, māhū and queer Indigenous cultural workers refuse colonial narratives by centering queer Indigenous relationalities that generate decolonial futures.



•**Dr. Pōmaika‘i Gushiken**, is a Kanaka ‘Ōiwi and Uchinānchu educator and researcher from Nānākuli, Hawai‘i.

Currently a UC Chancellor’s Postdoctoral Fellow at UCLA, he holds a Ph.D. in Ethnic Studies from UC San Diego.

His research focuses on decolonization, queer Indigenous futurity, and the intersections of pedagogy, refusal, and ea in Hawai‘i.
