"Susan Straight: Writing California, Character and Home"

In a delightful Holiday Luncheon (Virtual) on December 3, 2021, the UCR Creative Writing Professor and renowned novelist Susan Straight talked about her most recent memoir, *In the Country of Women*. Professor Straight shared pictures and memories that invoked her own past beautifully. She also called to mind a Riverside past that few of us remember as vividly as she. Extraordinarily generous with her time, Professor Straight also fielded wide-ranging questions with wit and humor. Moreover, she displayed an uncanny understanding of the



pain and violence implicit in all the rich stories of women both that she recounts and that still remain to be told. Everyone attending the lunch came away with a spectacular sense of how deeply and richly a great writer sees.

Recent Events Interpretive Walks Club: Botanic Garden Tour

On November 12, 2021, Professor Emerita of Botany, Darleen DeMason led a short tour of the UCR Botanic Gardens for 20 members of the Retirees and Emeriti Associations. The tour started inside the front gate where examples of different plant groups were represented. Dr. DeMason talked about plant classification and described the differences between gymnosperms (cone-bearing plants) and angiosperms (flowering plants). She also described the differences between monocotyledons (monocots) and dicotyledons (dicots) within flowering plants. During the tour the participants saw many types of conifers, Ginkgo and cycads that represent the diversity of gymnosperms. The bulk of the tour concentrated on plant adaptations to desert environments and the plants that characterize New World deserts and Old World deserts. The tour concluded with the viewing of the newly revamped rose gardens, the Iris Garden, the Butterfly Garden and the Scent Garden. The two hour tour was well received and we hope to do this tour again in the future.




Mystery Book Club: The Maidens by Alex Michaelides'

UCRRA's Undergraduate Student Scholarship Awards

Two undergraduate students are the 2021 recipients of the UCR Retirees' Association (UCRRA) Undergraduate Student Scholarship Award. Each student will receive a \$5,000 scholarship. The students were selected based on multiple criteria including being a child, grandchild, or close relative to a UCR staff member or retiree, has a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher, and is an under-represented student, a first generation student, a transfer student, a veteran, a foster youth, or an immigrant student.

The two student recipients are Alberto Flores and Nicholas Jimenez.

Alberto is pre-med and hopes for a career as a physician. He is the first member of his family to attend college. Alberto's aunt is a UCR retiree who encouraged Alberto to apply for the UCRRA scholarship. When Alberto was notified about his scholarship he stated, "As part of the next generation of future scholars, I am proud and humbled by the support from the UCR Retirees' Association". The UCRRA and all UCR's retirees wish Alberto success in his studies and look forward to his graduation and successful career.

Nicholas's father is a UCR staff member and works as an Automotive Equipment Operator. Nicholas expressed a heartfelt thank you when he was notified about his scholarship. He said, "I will use this scholarship and focus on getting my degree in order for a great future". Nicholas is determined to be

Thanks to the generosity of our wonderful colleagues who donated on Giving Tuesday, November 30, 2021, the new fund established to support the Emeriti Association's Graduate Student Travel Award now has a total of \$6,700 dollars. We are hopeful that this amount will increase, perhaps even double, because on Giving Tuesday we participated in the Beyond Brilliant Initiative. Application Details for the Edward A. Dickson Emeritus/a Professorship Award

Emeriti to Look Out for Announcement

Emeriti should watch for the Academic Senate announcement of the application for The Edward A. Dickson Emeritus/a Professorship Award. The Professorship Award is presented yearly to an emeritus/a professor on the basis of a compelling project in teaching, research, or public service activities. Awardee(s) shall be known as the Edward A. Dickson Emeritus/a Professor for the duration of the award (one year). Recipients also receive a monetary award.

COVID-19 Protocols When Returning to Campus

UCR continues to stay updated on the latest COVID-19 news while following the Riverside county and state guidelines to ensure safety. While the campus is currently open, there are safety guidelines in place for the UCR community to follow when visiting the campus. Below are guidelines to help retirees and emeriti with a smooth and safe transition into campus.

- Visitor Wellness Survey: Retirees and emeriti are required to complete the Visitor Wellness Survey on the day of their planned visit

- Face Coverings: Fully-vaccinated AND Not fully-vaccinated are required to wear face coverings over the nose and mouth at all times while indoors, in shared vehicles and outdoors if six feet of distance between people cannot be maintained.
- Retiree Red Lot Parking Permit: Retirees and emeriti who are current Lifetime or Annual Members of the UCR Retirees' and Emeriti
 Associations must ensure that their digital parking permit is renewed by contacting Transportation and Parking Services (TAPS) at
 (951) 827-8277. Once the permit is renewed with the preferred license plate added, UCRRA and UCREA members may park on
 campus.

The Citrus Variety Collection (CVC) was initiated in 1910 by staff of the Citrus Experiment Station and USDA researchers soon after the establishment of the Citrus Experiment Station. The purposes of the CVC are threefold: 1) to conserve and evaluate trueness-totype of citrus and citrus relatives; 2) to provide a resource of citrus genetic diversity for research; and 3) to extend knowledge about citrus diversity. Over the century, the CVC has included a total of approximately 4,000 citrus accessions. The UC Riverside CVC provides information, new citrus hybrids, plant material and a spirit of local as well as global cooperation.

The Edward A. Dickson Emeritus/a Professorship Lecture Series



"See What Happens"

Wendy Rogers, UCR Professor Emerita of the Dance Department Tuesday, February 15, 2022 at 3:00 p.m. Location and format to be determined

Wendy Rogers has made contemporary dances for over 50 years, first in the Bay Area and New York City, and then in Riverside where she was a member of the UCR dance faculty from 1996-2016. Three decades ago, Rogers transformed The Wendy Rogers Dance Company (1977-1990) into ten-year projects that intensify

ongoing creative cycles with collaborators. She received a University of California Edward A Dickson Emerita Professorship (2018-2019) to create new and re-visioned choreography for performance in the Life Arts Festival in San Diego. Past honors include fellowships from the Foundation for Contemporary Arts, the John Simon Guggenheim Foundation, the National Endowment for the Arts, and the Fulbright Foundation (Malaysia, 2009).

In this presentation, Wendy Rogers explores movement artifacts from her body of work (1968-present) by incorporating archival video and generating movement to evidence multiple histories at play in her dancemaking. Her talk will be structured around a debriefing of 'See What Happens,' the choreographic project of her 2018-2019 Dickson Professorship.

Dr. Rachel Wu is an Associate Professor of Psychology at University of California, Riverside. She completed her Ph.D. in Psychology at the University of London (2011). Dr. Wu recently received a 5-year CAREER award grant from the National Science Foundation to investigate the role of

learning new skills on cognitive and functional growth in older adulthood. She was in a rock band as a violinist for 7 years (2003-2010) and also is a professional artist in painting and sculpting. Every few years, she learns to master new skills to gain a better understanding of the difficulties in being an adult learner.
