Fall Luncheon

"Fortino Morales: UCR Campus Sustainability Initiatives"

UCR retirees and emeriti gathered at the Alumni and Visitors Center on September 23 for our annual Fall Luncheon. Our featured speaker at the Fall Luncheon was UCR Sustainability Officer Fortino Morales. When Fortino was an undergraduate at UCR, he helped to create the R'Garden, where students can grow their own food. Now, as UCR's first Sustainability Officer, he coordinates a wide range of efforts at UCR to reduce carbon emissions and the use of fossil fuels and to improve the ways in which UCR uses resources.

In years past, we took pride in various individual initiatives and programs as they emerged at UCR, such as the Center for Environmental Research and Technology (CE-CERT), the student-run R'Garden, the R'Pantry that fights food insecurity among UCR students, and so on. Today, all of these individual programs are part of long-term campuswide and UC-wide commitments to reduce carbon emissions and phase out the use of fossil fuels.

One sign of how UCR's sustainability efforts have expanded in recent years is that in 2022-2023, more than 40 undergraduates can earn fellowships of \$10,000 if they commit themselves to work 440 hours during the year on one of UCR's many sustainability projects. Some of these students will work in the R'Garden. Others will work in UCR's Office of Sustainability. Another group will assist the City of Riverside with its growing efforts at sustainability. A lively question and answer period followed the formal presentation.

[NOTE: In recognition of the rising costs of food and other services, we increased the fee of our luncheons from \$20 to \$25. Costs have been rising for the last several years and we had not increased luncheon fees. This was the first luncheon for which retirees and emeriti were asked to pay \$25 per person to attend, instead of the previous \$20. The Boards of both Associations have delayed increasing fees and used association revenues to subsidize the luncheons. Even with the fee increase, we will still need to subsidize events, but at a lower amount that will not jeopardize our other programmatic and scholarship goals.]

Interpretive Walks Club

Details: Our fourth event in this continuing club will provide Emeriti, Retirees and their guests with a tour of two of the newest buildings on campus. They are the newly constructed Student Success Center (SSC) and the renovated Barn complex. Brief descriptions of each of these buildings appear below.

The SSC is a 62,000-square-foot building, which opened in September, provides a major increase in classroom space to meet growing campus enrollment anticipated in coming years. It includes a mix of classrooms, small- to large-sized lecture halls, multipurpose rooms, student study areas, meeting rooms, and a student lounge. The total instructional seating capacity is 1,100. All entrances lead into a daylit central atrium called the Paseo, where a three-level staircase in the middle rises to a view of the sloped atrium roof. A prominent feature of the new building is its 400-seat in-the-round lecture hall that will be the first of its type on campus and within the UC system. The seats are tiered in a circle with swivel chairs that turn all the way around. A circular screen below the ceiling surrounds the room offering multiple views of video images from eight projectors.

The Barn predates the campus and was built in 1917 to house horses that worked the new University of California Citrus Experiment Station. Since the campus opened in 1954, the Barn has been a social hub for the campus, beginning as an eatery in the early years, converting to a beer/wine/event venue in the 1970's through the 1990's, and transitioning to a lunch venue until its closure in 2019. A \$30 million expansion project was approved to renovate and expand the Barn complex. The project included expanding the dining program with a new kitchen to increase the menu and added indoor and outdoor seating. Also included is the Barn Stable where faculty and staff can socialize with full bar and food service, the Barn Theatre to provide practice space for student dance and music, and an outdoor performance stage to provide entertainment. The new facility was finished just before the pandemic but has been reopened to once again become the social hub for students, faculty and staff. We will end the tour by joining "Happy Hour" for those who are interested.

"Enslaved.org: A Short (Digital) History"

Daryle Williams, UCR CHASS Dean and Professor of History Friday, December 9, 2022 from 11:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. In person at the UCR Alumni & Visitors Center, \$25 per person



We are honored to welcome the new Dean of CHASS, Dean Daryle Williams, as our speaker. Daryle Williams (he/him/his) serves as a Professor of History at the University of California, Riverside, and Dean of the College of Humanities, Arts, and Social Sciences. Prior to coming to UCR in September 2021, Williams spent most of his academic career at the University of Maryland and internationally.

Williams' teaching and scholarship focus is on modern Latin America, especially nineteenth- and twentieth-century Brazilian history. His work to build Enslaved.org, an online database documenting the experiences of enslaved people, has won widespread national media attention since its launch in December 2020.

Williams earned an undergraduate history degree and certificate in Latin American studies from Princeton University and a master's and Ph.D. in history from Stanford University.

Williams and his husband, Steven, live in historic downtown Riverside.

The Edward A. Dickson Emeritus/a Professorship Lecture Series

At UCR, three Dickson Fellowships are awarded each year to Emeriti who remain professionally active during their retirement. Upon the completion of their projects, UCR's Retirees and Emeriti Associations invite the Dickson Fellows to give public presentations of their work.

Our first Dickson presentation of the new academic year will be given on November 1 via Zoom by Howard Friedman, Distinguished Professor of Psychology Emeritus. Dr. Friedman will speak on the topic of "Flourishing, Long Life, and the Nature of Health," and will address the question: "Why do some people thrive well into old age while others become ill or die young?" Dr. Friedman notes that "Our studies of the lifetime pathways of 1500 Americans who were initially assessed as children in 1921 suggest a conceptual shift in how we think about health."

On January 17, 2023, Emeritus Professor of Philosophy Larry Wright will give an in-person talk on "Philosophical Understanding." Dr. Wright asks the question, "What should we expect of abstract reflection?" He offers the subtitle, "A scarred veteran's meditation on the hopes and hazards of philosophical inquiry."

In Spring 2023, at a date not yet set, the Dickson Lecture will be presented by US Poet Laureate Emeritus Juan Felipe Herrera. Dr. Herrera's project consists of writing, poetry, drawing, and performance and addresses such themes as sickness (Covid) and war (Ukraine).

Dickson Fellows who are scheduled to make presentations in 2023-2024 include Eric Barr in Fall 2023, Carolyn Murray in Winter 2024, and Conrad Rudolf in Spring 2024. We hope you will join us for many of these stimulating events.

UCR retirees and emeriti are invited to volunteer as advisors, judges, and referees as *FIRST* LEGO League (FLL) expands in our region this fall.

FLL is an international non-profit organization affiliated with the toy company. Teams of children ages 8-12 build robots from Legos and program them to perform a variety of missions. Additionally, the teams undertake an "innovation project," in which they identify a problem or need based on the year's theme and propose a solution to address it. This year, the theme is energy production, delivery, and consumption.

This year, the Riverside tournament will have at least five first-year teams. As the teams formulate their innovation projects, they must reach out to experts and practitioners in the community to share their ideas, obtain feedback, and refine the ideas. Therefore, any of our retirees and emeriti with knowledge of engineering, physical sciences, social sciences, public policy, or practical aspects of energy are invited to advise local teams.

Volunteer Opportunity Continued

The first local tournament will be on November 12 at UCR. For the first time, Riverside has been selected to host one of four Southern California regional tournaments (December 3 at California Baptist University) and the Southern California championship (December 12 at UCR) as well. All of these events will need volunteer judges, referees, and scorekeepers. No knowledge of robotics is required. An hour or two of training before the event is provided online. Each event will run approximately 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., and volunteers should plan on staying the entire time.

UCR has been associated with FLL for at least 15 years. It is an excellent program for teaching young people about programming and public issues as well as teamwork, inclusion, and innovation. Thanks to donations and a coordinated outreach effort involving UCR, Cal Baptist, the city's parks department, the Riverside Unified School District, and the Naval Surface Warfare Center, FLL has grown considerably this year. In 2023, the local leadership expects to expand to younger and older age levels.

- 2. The recipient(s) is a continuing, undergraduate student, who has a cumulative 3.0 GPA or higher.
- 3. The recipient(s) is an under-represented student, first generation college student, transfer student, student veteran, foster youth, and/or an immigrant student.
- 4. At the discretion of the UCRRA, the Financial Aid Office will determine the recipient(s) based on the above criteria and in coordination with the Office of Human Resources.
