Holiday Luncheon

"Dean Daryle Williams: Enslaved.org: A Short (Digital) History"

UCR Retirees and Emeriti gathered at the Alumni and Visitors Center on December 9 for our first in-person Holiday Luncheon in three years.

UCR Retirees' Association President Andy Plumley began the event by introducing recently appointed Associate Vice Chancellor and Chief Human Resources Officer Alex Najera. AVC Najera served previously as UCR's Director of Employee and Labor Relations, and in similar positions at CSU San Bernardino and other institutions before returning to UCR in September of this year. Najera is now happy to be back at UCR, and looks forward to working with UCR retirees, emeriti, and the Retirement Center. Andy also announced that we received about 25 applications for the 2022-2023 UCRRA Undergraduate Scholarship, and that the UCRRA Board would be deciding recipients at their December meeting.

UCREA Co-President Rusty Russell followed with news of the Emeriti Association. The 2022-2023 Distinguished Emerita/Emeritus Award is being shared by Kathleen Montgomery and Richard Luben. The Emeriti Graduate Student Travel Award for Fall 2022 has been awarded to Jessica Bradford. Jessica is a Ph.D. candidate in Anthropology, who will use the award to study the growing phenomenon of living in recreational vehicles (RVs). Following these announcements, Rusty convened a brief business meeting of the Emeriti Association, at which the members approved an amendment to the UCREA Bylaws that permits Presidents to be re-elected when the office of Vice President is vacant or the current Vice President has served less than a year in that office.

The featured speaker at the Holiday Luncheon was CHASS Dean Daryle Williams, who reported on his research on slavery. In collaboration with researchers at other universities, Williams has created a website called enslaved.org that allows visitors to search numerous datasets containing information about the lives of enslaved people. The goal is to make it possible to assemble short biographies of as many formerly enslaved and emancipated individuals as possible.

It was wonderful to see so many emeriti and retirees at this wonderful event, with a delicious lunch and beer and wine to toast the holiday season. We look forward to seeing you all in 2023!

Recent Events Fall 2022


Since the Fall Tower Talk went to press, our Mystery Book Club met on October 11 to discuss Philip Kerr's novel March Violets, and our monthly Zoom series of Tech-Tips had two informative sessions, one on "How to Use Cloud Storage" on October 11, and another on "How to Use Applications within Google Accounts" on November 8. At a reception in the Alumni and Visitor Center on October 21, Chancellor Kim Wilcox shared with us his vision of the future of UCR and joined us in celebrating the contributions and achievements of UCR retirees and emeriti. On November 1, Dickson Fellow and Distinguished Professor Emeritus Howard Friedman gave a Zoom presentation on the secrets of long life and good health. On December 2, our Interpretive Walks Club organized a stimulating tour of the new Student Success Center and the recently re-opened Barn. Our Holiday Luncheon on December 9 featured a presentation by new CHASS Dean Daryle Williams, who discussed his ongoing research on slavery.

Emeriti Association Graduate Student Travel Award

The Emeriti Association's new Graduate Student Travel Award helps graduate students meet the costs of travel to scholarly meetings or to research sites by providing \$1500 in funding for domestic travel or \$2,000 for travel outside the United States. In 2021 and 2022, the Emeriti Association created two funds to support this new fellowship program: a "current use" fund to support current awards, and an endowment fund that will provide long-term funding. After awarding our first Graduate Student Travel Award in April 2022, as of November we had accumulated a total of \$5,577.50 in the current use fund, and more than \$47,000 in the endowment fund. Encouraged by these successes in fundraising, the Emeriti Board voted at its November meeting to begin awarding two Emeriti Association Graduate Student Travel Awards every year, one in the Fall and one in the Spring. To ensure sufficient funding for future awards, members are encouraged to continue giving to the current use fund and/or to the endowment fund that support the Emeriti Association Graduate Student Travel Award.

Upcoming Winter 2023

Our Mystery Book Club will discuss Peter Robinson's In a Dry Season on January 10, Into the Woods by Tana French on February 14, and Black Corridors by Constance and Gwenyth Little On March 14. The Dickson Lecture by Professor of Philosophy Emeritus Larry Wright that was originally slated for January 17 has been rescheduled for April 4. At our Winter Luncheon on February 10, the featured speaker will be world-renowned novelist and UCR Creative Writing Professor Laila Lalami. On February 14, our Tech-Tips series will offer a Zoom presentation on "Best Practices when Backing Up Your Computer." On February 23, Fidelity Investments will offer advice on "Tax Efficient Investing." On March 3, 1-2:30, our Interpretive Walks Club will organize a tour of the new Cheech Center in downtown Riverside. On March 14, the Tech-Tips series will take up the issue of "How to Change Settings on Devices for Easy Reading." 



Interpretive Walks Club: UCR Student Success Center and UCR Barn

By Andy Plumley On Friday, December 2nd, the Interpretive Walks Club toured two of UCR's latest buildings, starting with the new Student Success Center and ending with the old Barn.

The Student Success Center (SSC) tour was led by Assistant Dean of Students Brendan O'Brien. The SSC building planning began in 2019 to address the campus need for more classroom space and more student study and program space. These two needs drove the SSC's design and the building features state-of-the-art classrooms which includes UCR's first lecture-in-the round. Large and small student meeting and study spaces are throughout the building. Most impressive in the building is the central stair atrium that provides light from expansive windows and study spaces along the edges of the stairwell. As our tour was held during finals, every seat in the building was occupied. Two additions to come for this building will be an information kiosk and a small dining store. And planning is already being considered for another SSC!

After our SSC tour, the group walked over to the new Barn Complex. The original Barn had its beginnings in 1917, housing horses and wagons for the new UC Citrus Experiment Station. This building has gone through many changes in its 100 year history, from dining to bar and bands to dining. One mainstay has always been serving as a hub for interactions between students, faculty, staff and community. In 2012, discussions began of a new, reimagined Barn, expanding the dining program and bringing back entertainment and alcohol. After many stops and starts and leadership changes, the new Barn plan was approved and the Barn closed for construction in 2019. The project was completed in spring of 2020, but it's opening was delayed due to Covid. Moses Preciado, Sr. Dining Services Manager, provided us a tour, and while almost all of the Barn complex is new, the main Barn building features the original truss system. In addition to the main building, there is a large kitchen for all day and night dining, two patios with one featuring an outdoor performance stage, the Barn Theater for music and dance performance practice, and the Barn Stable which features a full bar and will soon be reopened for dining and drinks. We celebrated the end of our tour with a few beers and glasses of wine!

2022-2023 Distinguished Emeriti Award Recipients: Kathleen Montgomery and Richard Luben By Dal

Professor of Organizations and Management Emerita Kathleen Montgomery joined the faculty of the School of Business in 1990. Following her retirement in 2010, she has continued to distinguish herself through her research, her professional service and nationally and internationally through her activism.

In her research since retirement, Montgomery has published eight refereed journal articles, she has served as editor or co-editor of thirteen books and she has contributed fifteen chapters to edited books. She also has made sixteen conference presentations since her retirement. In 2014, she held the Edward A. Dickson Emerita Professorship for the UCR campus.

Professor Emerita Montgomery has an outstanding record of professional and University service since

retirement. She has served, and continues to serve, on the editorial boards of three professional journals. She has served on award selection committees of several professional organizations. Her University service has been extensive. System-wide, she was a member of the UC President's Cyber-Risk Governance Committee for four years, she was on the UC Academic Senate Committee on Academic Freedom for three years, and she chaired the committee for two of those three years. Her service to UCR includes being a member of 5 senate or chancellor's committees. She was chair of the Committee on Academic Freedom for one year and currently is chair of the Committee on Rules and Jurisdiction.

Montgomery has long championed issues related to women in organizations and leadership. She has been active in the League of Women Voters (LWV). She represented the LWV of the United States at the UN Commission on the Status of Women in 2019-2020. She is co-founder of the Human Rights Special Interest Group (HRSIG), a non-profit, research-based group that evolved from the UN Commission meeting. The mission of the HRSIG is to inspire local community efforts to educate, advocate for and implement human rights policies and goals (<u>www.hrsig.org</u>).

In recognition of her outstanding professional contributions, Professor Emerita Montgomery was elected Fellow of the Academy of Social Sciences in 2018.



Richard A. Luben joined the Division of Biomedical Sciences and the Department of Biochemistry in 1976. Following his retirement as Professor Emeritus in 2006, he has a record of outstanding service to UC Riverside. He has continually taken on heavy service duties, and he has contributed to the teaching programs of both the Division of Biomedical Sciences and the Department of Biochemistry.

Since his retirement, Professor Luben has served in high-visibility administrative positions. He served as Special Assistant to UCR's Vice Chancellor for Research from 2006 to 2009, as Special Assistant to UCR's Vice Chancellor of Health Affairs from 2009-2012, as Chair of the Department of Biochemistry from 2017-2020, and as UCR's Research Integrity Officer from 2018-2020.

Professor Luben has made, and continues to make, significant contributions to the UCR School of Medicine (SOM). He has served continuously on the SOM's Admission Committee since his retirement. Medical school admissions requires extensive work by members of the committee with file reviews, evaluations and discussions of each candidate. The SOM annually receives thousands of applications (currently over 7,000 applications for 80 seats). Each committee member provides written evaluations of 10 applicants each week from September to March.

Since his retirement, Professor Luben has also contributed to the teaching mission of both the School of Medicine and the Department of Biochemistry. This has included teaching in the Department of Biochemistry's Topics in Human Biochemistry course from 2006-2017, in General Biochemistry from 2006-2016 and the Signal Transduction and Biochemical Regulation course in 2017. In addition, during his time as Chair of the Department of Biochemistry, he organized the Department's two advising courses: Topics in Biochemistry for Career Planning, designed for incoming freshmen biochemistry majors, and Introduction to Humanitarian and Healthcare Service, designed for biochemistry majors planning careers in Health Professions.
