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The Edward A. Dickson Emeritus/a
Professor Presentation

HANDFUL OF GRAVEL, a live performance May 12, 2023

Retirees and Emeriti walked through the spacious halls of UCR's Student Success Center on May 12 to reach the building's Multipurpose Rooms, two of which were joined together to host *Handful of Gravel*. This live performance featured Juan Felipe Herrera's poetry about the War in Ukraine and the COVID Pandemic. It put into ensemble action the combined forces of four UCR Creative Writing and two Dance MFA and PhD students who voiced Herrera's poetry, amidst music improvised by three UCR Music and Creative Writing faculty plus a widely-known guest performer.



Emeriti Association Co-President Rusty Russell welcomed the audience, thanked the event sponsors, and introduced Herrera, a Poet Laureate Emeritus of the United States and winner of many awards and prizes for poetry. Herrera himself gave expansive thanks to UCR sponsors, the facility and production staff, and the "tech youngsters," as he put it, who staffed the microphones and made the livestream recording. He also spoke briefly about a quantum physics principle that helped inspire his writing during the just-passed year he had spent as an Edward A. Dickson Emeritus/a Professor at UCR, noting "everything connects with everything else," an idea he elaborated in the printed programme. Herrera mixed these introductory remarks with "call and response" dialogue with the audience.

Bringing together music with spoken word and bodily movement, this event was the first to use the SSC Multipurpose Rooms for live performance. Seated on three sides of a rectangular performing space, viewers were able to see the production from several vantage points while slides projected onto overhead screens showed images Herrera had inked as part of his own creative process. Herrera had organized his long poem in about six chapters or sections which were spoken by poets Roda Avelar, Efren Castro, Carlina Perna, and Victoria Hurtado-Angulo and dancers Jorge Poveda Yanez and Mariia Bakalo. The six of them moved together as an ensemble, sometimes standing near the musicians in a loose crescent formation, at other times striding across the floor or shuttling toward and away from the audience. At several points, the dancers soloed or performed duets of their own composition, using movement qualities that responded to the urgent issues that the poetry raised. (Continued on page 4)

Recent Events Spring 2023

Our Spring calendar opened with a Dickson Lecture by Professor of Philosophy Emeritus Larry Wright on April 4. On Friday May 12 at 4: 00 p.m., U.S. Poet Laureate Emeritus and current Dickson Fellow Juan Felipe Herrera led a multi-media production of his poems at UCR's Student Success Center. On Friday May 19, UCR's Emeriti and Retirees held our annual Spring Luncheon. The featured speaker at the Spring Luncheon was the Emeriti Association's 2022 Distinguished Professor Emeritus Wilfred Elders, who spoke about the "Green Energy and White Gold" now being harvested from the Salton Sea Geothermal Field. Following on the success of <mark>our first vi</mark>sit to Riverside's new Cheech Museum on March 3, another 20 UCR emeriti, retirees, and guests toured "the Cheech" on June 2.

Emeriti Association Graduate Student Travel Award

The Emeriti Association's Graduate Student Travel Award helps graduate students meet the costs of travel to scholarly meetings or to research sites by providing \$1,500 in funding for domestic travel or \$2,000 for travel outside the United States. The Emeriti Board voted at its November meeting to begin awarding two Emeriti Association Graduate Student Travel Awards every year. The recipient of the Fall 2022 award, Anthropology Ph.D. candidate Jessica Bradford attended our annual Spring Luncheon on May 19. The recipient of the Spring 2023 Graduate Student Travel Award was to be selected later in the Spring. To support the expense of awarding two

graduate student fellowships per year, the Board designated funds to support current fellowships as the primary target for gifts during this year's UCR Give Day on April 6. Thanks to gifts and pledges received from 33 donors, more than \$8,000 was raised during this campaign. Members are encouraged to continue giving to the current use fund and/or to the endowment fund that support the Emeriti Association Graduate Student Travel Award.

Upcoming Summer and Fall 2023

As the 2023-2024 academic year begins, it is time for annual members of the Association to renew their memberships, and for all of us to reach out to recently retired faculty and invite them to become involved in Emeriti Association activities. Waves of improvised music were interspersed with the "chapters" of spoken poetry, and here too the poets and dancers moved together as a group. Guest performer Francis "Pancho" Wong played saxophone, with UCR faculty Deborah Wong on percussion, Terry Nguyen on taiko, and Tom Lutz on electronic keyboard. Often the improvised score echoed the intensity of the experiences and emotions that the poets and dancers signaled with their voices and their bodies. When the voices and movement crescendoed and subsided at the piece's conclusion, the music played on for another minute, then grew still.

During the post-performance Q and A session, viewers queried Herrera about his creative process, and also about the process by which the sound score had been created. That brought the musicians into the conversation to speak about their working methods. The dancers, and also a poet speaking for her peers, elaborated aspects of the collaborative process by which they created the performance with Herrera. Herrera acknowledged the critical input of Yumi Hatta. He concluded with a story about his third grade teacher,



Mrs. Sampson, who encouraged him to speak, sing, and write: "You have a beautiful voice," she told him. The event closed with a reception in the adjacent room.

Spring Luncheon

"Wilfred Elders: Green Energy and White Gold in California"

When UCR Retirees and Emeriti gathered for our annual Spring Luncheon on May 19, the featured speaker was Professor Emeritus Wilfred A. Elders.

Wilfred Elders retired from UCR's Department of Geology in 1994 and has remained professionally active throughout the subsequent decades. In 2000 Elders was appointed Co-Principal Investigator of the Iceland Deep Drilling Project, an international effort to explore the development of extremely high temperature geothermal resources. In recent years, he has focused his efforts on geothermal systems in California, specifically the Salton Sea Geothermal Field.

On May 19, Elders spoke about ways in which geothermal energy can be seen as "Green Energy and White Gold in California." Geothermal energy is "green," because it keeps carbon dioxide out of the atmosphere. It is a source of "white gold," because valuable metals such as lithium and manganese can be extracted as byproducts of the processes that harvest geothermal energy. Lithium is an essential component of batteries for electric cars. Elders quoted an estimate that the brine in the Salton Sea Geothermal Field contains reserves of between one and six million tons of lithium. To encourage greater use of these resources, the State of California has now established a "Lithium Valley Commission" with headquarters in the Imperial Valley.

It was exciting for the audience to hear about these possibilities, and to see that a UCR Professor Emeritus is so closely involved in the changes taking place. In 2016, Elders received the Pioneer Award of the Geothermal Resources Council. In 2017, he received a Special Achievement Award from the Geothermal Association of Mexico. A year ago, UCR's Emeriti Association selected Elders for recognition as our Distinguished Emeritus of 2021-

2022. On May 19, we enjoyed a brief look at the some of the activities that have won Wilfred Elders so many awards.

"Larry Wright: Philosophical Understanding" By Raymond Russell and John Ganim

The Dickson Lecture series returned to a live, in-person format on Tuesday, April 4, 2023 with a lecture on "Philosophical Understanding," by Larry Wright, 2020-2021 Edward A. Dickson Professor Emeritus and Professor Emeritus of Philosophy.

Larry Wright has taught at UCR since 1970. He is the author of Practical Reasoning (1989), Better Reasoning: Techniques for Handling Argument, Evidence & Abstraction (1982), and the widely used and reprinted Critical Thinking: An Introduction to Analytical Reading and Reasoning (2001). His book, Teleological Explanations: An Etiological Analysis of Goals and Functions (1976) remains a starting and ending point for many of its topics, and is still debated today, especially in the philosophy of science.



He has more recently devoted his time and energy primarily to investigating the relation, and some of the differences, between the concepts of argument and explanation, and the illusions generated by our competence with them. What should we expect of abstract reflection? His lecture provided some examples and their difficulties.

Professor Wright told us about the progress of his career, from his beginning as an engineer to his immersion in philosophy. He has been a foundation of UCR's intellectual community across many departments, exemplified by the nearly half-century open reading group on the work of Ludwig Wittgenstein and others that he has led.

Professor Wright confessed to the audience that years of wrestling with the philosophical classics have made him "a mealy-mouthed compatiblist." Many disagreements among authors are more apparent than real. Wright asserts that in order to understand a work or to learn something from it, it is necessary to get a sense of what is "true" about it. Even to recognize that someone chose the wrong word, you first have to understand what they said. This leads Wright to subscribe to a "principle of charity:" one must first be sympathetic to an author in order to understand them.

As one would expect from someone who won the UCR Distinguished Teaching Award (2008-09), the question and answer segment was lively and engaged, with participation both by Department of Philosophy faculty and graduate students and by UCREA and OSHER members, who held their own.

Fall 2022 UCREA Graduate Student Recipient Awarded

The UCR Emeriti Association proudly awarded Anthropology Ph.D. candidate Jessica Bradford with the Fall UCREA Graduate Student Travel Award and announced it at the Spring Luncheon. The Emeriti Association Co-President Raymond Russell shared highlights of Jessica's travel award application and her research which is titled, "Quasi-homeownership among Full-time RVers: A Sociocultural and Economic Study of Housing Decision-Making in Mesa, Arizona."

Jessica shared her appreciation for being selected as the Fall 2022 recipient of the UCREA Graduate Student Travel Award and reported on how the travel award of \$1,500 benefited her research.

"This UCREA Travel Award has been extremely beneficial in that it enabled me to get to my fieldsite in Arizona. I used the funds primarily on fuel, new tires for the RV, and my first month's rent at the destination park in Arizona. This park is one of the only all-age parks, where my target population (25-55 year old full-time RVers) reside, so that I can inquire on the economic and sociocultural conditions behind the rise in full-time RVing among employment aged adults."

Help with Collecting & Sharing Scholarly Publications By Doug Mitchell

The UC Office of Scholarly Communication (OSC) has released a "Toolkit" to help authors to collect and archive the entire corpus of their publications on eScholarship, the UC open access website for scholarly publications. The aim is to increase access to, and use of, this University program supporting organized access to the treasure trove of scholarly work generated by UC faculty. Using this storage hub will help secure the legacy of UC scholars while promoting the University as a leading center for open access to high quality scholarly work. The toolkit offers emeriti and active faculty step-by-step guidance for preparing web-based storage and access to all of their scholarly works. Using the Toolkit

In a word of warning, the toolkit reminds us that, "Organizing a lifetime of publications can be a demanding task." Some authors may have staff help or resources, but most of us will have to do for ourselves the relatively tedious work of preparing and posting manuscripts. In reasonably clear and detailed instructions, however, the Scholarly Communications team break the task into relatively manageable tasks.

Collecting & Sharing Scholarly Publications continued

The Toolkit is Comprise of Five Parts

- 1. Creating your list (of publications)
- 2. Collecting your files (electronic manuscripts ready to post)
- 3. Figuring out contracts and copyrights
- 4. Putting work online
- 5. Wrapping up and related issues



When using the toolkit, we are advised to begin preparing a few publications at a time rather than trying to do all of your manuscripts at once. There is some help for the most challenging of these tasks – dealing with contract and copyright permissions. Consulting with OSC staff can be helpful.
